## Busch, U.N. Order Schlafly To Submit To Bottling Plant Inspections – Demand Full Compliance

UNITED NATIONS — Despite repeated warnings from Busch, the Schlafly regime moves forward with the construction of its new bottling plant. Responding to pressure from the international community, Busch and the U.N. ordered Schlafly to submit to bottling plant inspections Thursday.

"For years, Schlafly has hidden the ominous doings of their brewing and development facility from the outside world. It ends now!" a determined U. N. Secretary General Kofi Annan said.

The beer-making capabilities of Schlafly's heavily fortified Tap Room compound have long been a source of speculation. Schlafly, defying international calls for full disclosure, have maintained their silence regarding the brewery's suspected capacity to manufacture and disseminate beverages of mass consumption. The construction of this new, larger bottling facility only fans the flames of an already tense standoff.

Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov said the first round of inspections at The Bottleworks has been "fruitful," and that "inspectors have been given prompt access and faced relatively few difficulties." Ivanov went on to express hope that Schlafly would be more forthcoming with documents and other evidence.

So far U.N. beverage inspectors have found no evidence of mobile or underground brewing facilities but that has not stopped the U.N. from demanding the immediate destruction of over 150 3.3 gallon Keglets recently found that reportedly have C02 cylinders capable of exceeding their legal pouring range. In addition, Schlafly brewers have finally agreed to be interviewed without escorts or recording devices. While Busch admits it is a step in the right direction, he is quick to point out that this present cooperation may be just another "tactic of deceit to further delay and throw us off the trail."

"This is their final, extra last chance and I mean it," a determined Busch told reporters Tuesday. Busch went on to state that "Schlafly clearly has constructed this impressive new facility for one purpose and one purpose only and that is to supply the people of the world with delicious, flavorful beverages of mass consumption, and they must be stopped at all cost."

Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, a longtime advocate of regime change in the Schlafly empire, is urging Busch to consider military intervention should Schlafly refuse to cooperate.
